

Both 'Skins, Falcons Win

Neshaminy Defeats Allen High, 28-14; Kaminski Scores 2

ALLENTOWN — Neshaminy High Coach William Allen here tonight with a devastating one-two punch — bruising line play and an offensive attack that glistened with collegiate finesse.

The final count was 28-14, which certainly indicates it wasn't all peaches and cream for the triumphant Redskins. But, realizing the host Canaries didn't score until the final quarter, it really was.

Neshaminy, for want of a more flowery description, was very impressive. The Redskins played an outstanding brand of football that puzzled Lehigh Valley sports writers as to how they ever lost to Easton last week.

Get Rolling Early

John Petercuskie's well-trained charges marched to paydirt with the opening kickoff, then annexed a pair of second-quarter TDs to sport a 21-0 halftime advantage.

The squad's offensive machine was spearheaded by senior halfback Ed Kaminski, who racked up the first two touchdowns and was a thorn in Allen's side all night long.

In fact, the 5-8 165-pound speedster passed for the third touchdown in the waning seconds of the first half after setting up the score with a 55-yard aerial from a picture-perfect triple reverse.

The Redskins paraded 84 yards in 10 plays for their initial six-pointer and continued the excellent offensive performance well into the second half.

Canaries Connect

Allen High, a victor over perennial Eastern Conference power-house West Scranton last week, finally checked into the scoring column in the last quarter behind quarterback Joe Petro.

Petro sneaked across from three yards away on the first play to prevent a shutout, then fired a 49-yard pass to end Jack Pearson a bit later.

The Canaries' scoring stint halted the Neshaminy lead and it appeared for awhile the margin might even get closer. Allen recovered a Redskins fumble on the kickoff following its second TD

with two minutes remaining, but Neshaminy dug in and that was that.

Other Tribe TDs

Other Neshaminy touchdowns were registered by end Al Rell and fullback Bob Baxter. Rell caught a nine-yard pass thrown by Kaminski while Baxter galloped 45 yards for the fourth tally late in the third quarter.

After each of the six-pointers, end Bill Schemberg put his toe to the pigskins and split the uprights. Halfback Ron Flahart did it twice for the Canaries.

All in all, it was a fine showing for the Lower Bucks entry against a formidable but outclassed opponent. It was a well-earned conquest for the Redskins, who didn't waste any time returning to the victory trail.

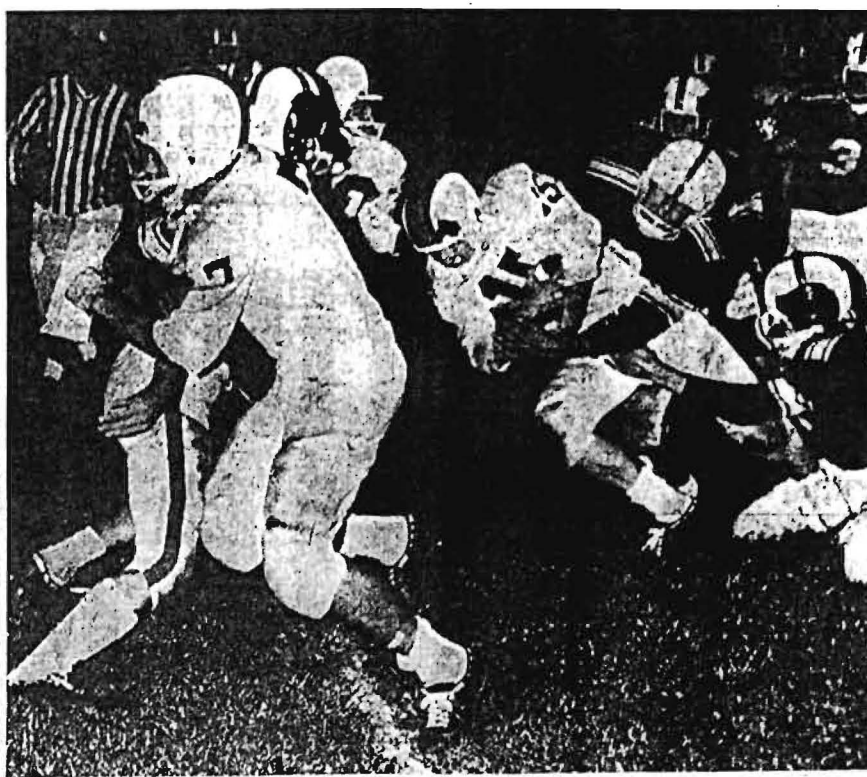

Ford, O'Toole Appeared Ready For Series Start

Why wait for Wednesday? — Whitey Ford and Jim O'Toole, the two southpaws who'll open the World Series, look ready to go right now.

Both took their final tune-ups Friday night and although Ford was a mite sharper of the two, O'Toole turned in a smooth enough performance to win his 19th and bring a nod of approval from Cincinnati Manager Freddie Hutchinson.

Ford struck out nine in a scoreless six-inning stint for the New York Yankees, allowed only four

winning run in the ninth to bring reliever Rollie Sheldon his 11th victory.

Like Ford, O'Toole also gave up four hits during the five innings he pitched for the Reds in their 8-1 victory over last year's world champion Pittsburgh Pirates.

O'Toole, however, struck out only five and was nicked for a run in the fifth on rookie Donn Clendenon's triple and Dick Stuart's single. Ken Johnson and Sherm Jones held Pittsburgh hitless over the last four innings. Gordon Coleman hit his 26th homer off loser Larry Fox.
