

# Morrisville, Neshaminy Tie

## Bulldogs, Redskins, Falcons, Panthers Win in League Ends In Deadlock

Neshaminy and Morrisville completed their Lower Bucks County League season in a tie with 10-10 records at the championships yesterday. The Redskins and Bulldogs both ended with 6-6 1/2 league loss. It was the seventh year in-a-row Neshaminy either won or shared the flag. It is the first year of any championship for coach Gordon Davies of Morrisville in 15 years.

Neshaminy moved past Bensalem Township 7-0 and Morrisville routed Bristol, 38-7. Pennsylvania turned in a major upset with a 12-7 win over Delaham. William Tennant capped his third game in-a-row with a 14-0 conquest of Council Rock.

Today is the day for turkey hash, turkey-burgers, turkey pie and other varieties of leftovers—including leftover football. Here are a few thoughts.

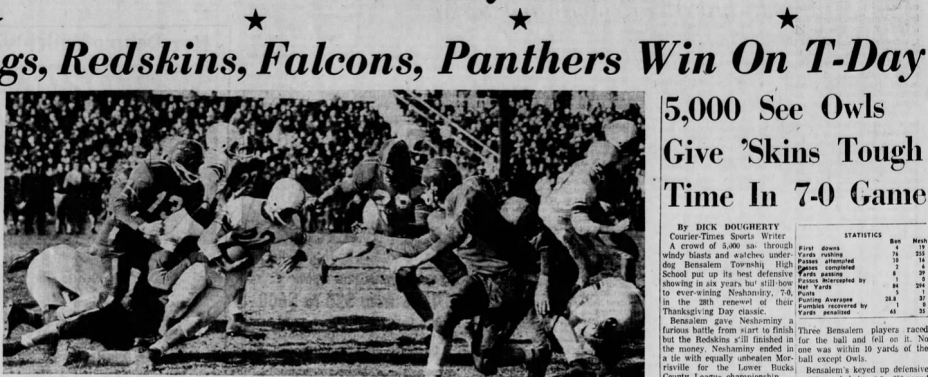
The Lower Bucks County High School Football League teams displayed in their Thanksgiving Day traditional engagements that we truly had a balanced eight-team race this season.

## Hart, Immordino Score 4 TD's In Routing Bristol, 38-7

It was a happy Thanksgiving Day feast for the Morrisville team, head coach Gordon Davies and the remainder of the team, who celebrated their one-sided 38-7 win over Bristol which gave the Bulldogs their first unbeaten game since James took over in 1943, and also the co-championship of the Lower Bucks County League.

In presenting Davies of Morrisville triumph, the Morrisville team handled to six touchdowns and two conversions, the highest point total of either team in the history of the 21 meetings in the traditional Turkey Day series. The previous high was 31 scored by Morrisville in 1946. It was Morrisville's 11th win of its series with five games ending in ties. Bristol has won 15.

The Bristol team was demoralized early in the game as Morrisville scored twice within the first five minutes to take a 14-0 lead as Dick Hart went 71 yards on a pass play in the second quarter.

Mike Immordino traveled 45 yards to score the second touchdown when Morrisville got the ball again after the kickoff.

At the half, the Bulldogs led 20-0. Two more touchdowns in the third quarter put Morrisville ahead, 24-0.
