

# Schub's 41-7 Free Helps Neshaminy Rip Pennsbury

## Redskins Roll Up 41-7 Victory At Falcons' New Football Field

Coach John Petereske and his Neshaminy High A squad held Pennsbury open at their home football field on Saturday afternoon—but the Redskins were very incoordinated guests.

They drubbed the Falcons, 41-7, behind the four touch-downs scored by Larry Harry Schub, in a stay unbroken four in the way coming in Lower Bucks League competition.

The home club did salvage something, however, the Falcons were the first Lower Bucks loop eleven to score on the track, early assembled by Petereske.

## Egan Eleven Rallies To Tie Notre Dame

TRIDENT—An interception and a fumble led to the second period led to a pair of Notre Dame High School touchdowns, and almost resulted in the first Irish grid victory since the school started playing football last year. But the favored Bishop Egan High Eagles rallied to tie a touch-down of their own in the hectic second quarter and went into the fourth period to get a 13-13 tie after 1:50 run at the Notre Dame field. Then a pass by Al Pizzola in the left half and he raked down the side line and was easily caught from behind by Jeff Jablon on the 41. Pizzola gained six yards, and then Terrellini carried it over from the four. The kick was blocked and Egan trailed, 13-6, at the half.

In the third period, a poor punt gave Notre Dame a first down on the Egan 20, but the Irish were stopped.

**Fumble Recovers Fumble**  
 Egan got its best break of the game—the first play of the final quarter—when another player covered a fumble on the Egan 12.

Twelve plays later, Terrellini had been covered and Terrellini crossed from the three, going off his own right tackle on a "keep" play.

Herb Ruffarth kicked the ball into the important extra point to give Egan a 13-13 tie. During the march for the equalizer, Egan stayed on the ground all the way after the three was failed on the first play.
