

# Neshaminy Clinches At Least A Tie For League Title

Neshaminy High clinched at least a tie for the Lower Bucks County League championship by taming the Delhaas Tigers, 33-6, before 3500 fans last night at the Neshaminy Field.

It was the seventh straight circuit triumph for the Redskins, giving them a two-game lead over Morrisville, the only team in the league that can tie them. Morrisville meets Woodrow Wilson tonight and has Bensalem and Bristol remaining on its schedule. Bensalem was eliminated from at least a tie by losing its game to Pennsbury last night.

There was little to the clobbering handed Delhaas by the league-leaders as the Franks - Petercuskie coached team racked up 23 first downs and netted a total of 418 yards on the ground and in the air.

### Redskins Score Early

Neshaminy scored all its points in the first three periods, scoring pairs of touchdowns in the second and third sessions. In the finale, the 'Skins were close but a pass interception broke up the drive and gave Delhaas its lone score. Neshaminy used 31 players in the game.

Hammering Harry Schuh and Ed Fiorelli scored twice for the winners with Jack Stricker making the other. Bob Ramsey booted three of his five tries at con-

version. The two touchdowns by Schuh raised his season's output to 96 points, 72 of which were scored in league competition.

Johnny Fork's 78-yard interception of a throw by Ed Kaminski gave the Tigers its score with 48 seconds remaining to be played in the game.

The seven blocks of concrete in the Neshaminy line held the Delhaas team to a net gain of 37 yards rushing with 21 of these being netted in the third quarter. The losers had four first downs, three coming on passes.

### Schuh Scores

Schuh made his touchdowns on a one-yard plunge and a 36-yard end run. His one-yard rush climaxed a drive of 60 yards from the opening kickoff which saw the Neshaminy backs move the ball to Touchdownland in 10 plays and four first downs. Jack Stricker had opened the drive with a 22-yard canter around end.

The second Schuh TD ended a 91-yard march which took seven plays to complete. Tom Rickards helped with two runs of 14 and 10 yards and Stricker had a 19-yard scamper. Stricker also threw the key block to open the path for Schuh to travel his 36 yards for the score.

Senior end Fiorelli scored his fourth and fifth touchdowns of the season in the second and third

stanzas. He caught a 14-yard end zone pass from Johnny Kurtz for his first score. In the third session, he busted up a Delhaas scoring threat by swiping a pass and going 78 yards for a score.

When Fiorelli caught his touchdown pass, it was the fourth time that he was on the receiving ends of aerials thrown by Johnny Kurtz. The others were on throws of 44, 60, and 19 yards.

### Stricker Goes Over

Stricker dove over the line from the one on his touchdown and finished a drive which started on the Neshaminy 33, following a quick-kick by Johnny Fork. Tom Rickards started the ball moving by hauling the ball 27 yards in three plays. Then Kurtz whipped a pass to Fiorelli for 13 yards. Schuh added 11 and on two plays, Stricker took it over.

In the first period, Delhaas never had the ball beyond its 47 yard line. It got into Neshaminy territory early in the second session when Conti completed a short pass to Dick Stump for a first on the Redskins' 45. In the third quarter, Delhaas made its best bid for a score which was broken by Fiorelli's interception. The Tigers never reached midfield in the finale.

Neshaminy was headed for another score in the fourth quarter as sophomore Ed Kaminski began to shower the area with forward passes. He completed three out-of-four to move the pigskin from the Neshaminy 13 to the Delhaas 27. His passes were 25 yards to Kurtz, 22 to Schuh, and 13 to Stricker. But on his fifth try, Fork stepped in front of the receiver and behind wonderful inference made the Delhaas TD on a 78-yard run.
