Schuh, Kurtz Score In 12-0 Victory

Capitalizing on a fumble and a well-executed pass, Neshaminy scored twice in the second half to win over Pennsylvania, 12-0, before 4,000 fans last night on the Neshaminy High Field in a hard-hitting but clean game.

After battling the Redskins to a standstill in the first half, Pennsylvania seemed to weaken towards the finish of the third period when with 30 seconds to go, Neshaminy made its first score with Harry Schuh going over from the one. Only 22 seconds remained in the tilt when the Redskins went into the air to try pay dirt on a 34-yard completion.

The Neshaminy airmove score was the result of a double-reverse pass with Al Gaskill heaving the ball to Johnny Kurtz who was

in holding the Falcons to 15 grounds yards.

After holding the playing field to a modified most of the first quarter, both teams had a second-session threat. Neshaminy marched on its 26 to the Pennsylvania 12 before losing out on downs. Pennsylvania was on the Neshaminy 22 as the result of a 33-yard pass, George Tama to Al Matzua. On the fourth down, deflected pass escaped Matzua's outstretched hands.

Recovers Fumble

Schuh paved the way for the first Neshaminy score by recovering a Mario Tama fumble in the 42 and then going all the way on line plays.

The second touchdown climaxed a 35-yard drive, the damage being on eight drives with the 34-yard pass netting the TD.

It was the fourth straight win for Neshaminy whose over-all record is 4-1. Pennsylvania, in one of its poorest seasons, has but one win in five tries, losing its last four tilts.

He did complete his last try for a 19-yard gain.
