er was the Bristol boss in 1948.

Van Horn's appearance at Bensalem started a new era for the Cornwells Heights institution. Bensalem packed away the banner in 1949 and 1950.

Anthony "Chick" D'Angelo worked with Bristol in 1951 and his club was the league champion. Bensalem ended the 1951 season in a tie with Morrisville, coached by Gordon Davies, for second place.

Harry Franks took over a slumping Neshaminy High School team in 1952 and quickly molded one of the best football machines in the league's history. Neshaminy was undefeated in league play in 1952.

Neshaminy Jolted

In 1953 Franks guided his club to nine straight wins (18 overall) to a Thanksgiving Day meeting with Bensalem. Van Horn's team jarred Neshaminy and gained a tie for the title.

Neshaminy is still the king in the area today. The Redskins have not lost a league game since 1953. Trophies from 1954, 1955 and 1956 are in the Redskin throne room.

Six schools have had a title at one time or another. Since 1935 Bristol, Morrisville, Bensalem and Neshaminy have been the best for a couple of years but then slipped into the background and another school stepped to the front. The question is, who's next?
