

# Neshaminy humiliates Allentown, 18-0, Before 6,500

**NEW YORK (UPI)—**If the New York Yankees blow their third straight World Series game today you can expect to see Manager Casey Stengel explode like Vesuvius.

Casey is spragated at his pitchers, with special, ultra-strict orders on Bob Turley, irritated at his hitters, with a particular rash over Yogi Berra, and chokes over his relief defense, with Gil McDougald the most toxic tormenter.

And while he discourses willingly in a few thousand well chosen words on the shortcomings of his humbled heroes, nobody else had better do it.

### Speed They Wanted

This was fiascoed yesterday as Casey worked the club at Yankee Stadium in preparation for today's third game.

A trio of television interviewers, complete with cameramen, audio engineers and picture tube hot-bombs dissected the manager's interrupted Stengel's m.o. on a lounge aimed his woe to suggest brightly that he stand before the cameras. They hinted brazenly that speed was the essence.

Casey's wrath whitened. The veins around his eyes took on the appearance of a relief map of the Magnin Line. The blue eyed iced over like Hudson's Bay in December.

"So you're in a huff," graded Casey. "Well, now and then, I know work out here."

He turned to Ted Kim.

Eventually, he stood before the battery of cameras, however, and the interviewers were to work on him.

"Do you suppose," he was asked, "that the Yankees choke up?"

The seamy Stengel features purpled. The Stengel eyes bulged. The Stengel hands bunched.

"Young man," he replied in a voice which sounded much like cold pouring down a chute, "do you choke up on the milk?" "No!"

"Well, if anybody does choke up around here it will be somebody other than a milk. Not my ballplayers."

Stengel's voice dropped to a low rumble.

"He," he thundered, "ain't afraid of anybody. Maybe we just need to get a little mad and we're rotting." It's nothing just winnin' one ball game won't cure 'em.

The interview was terminated rapidly and Stengel was obviously annoyed even at that because, he grumbled, "there were a few more things I coulda told those there 250."

## Lightning Takes Upset Canaries; Schuh Scores Twice

An inspired Neshaminy High school football team tripped powerful Allentown from the undefeated ranks, 18-0, before 6,500 astonished fans last night at Langhorne.

Neshaminy displayed its finest defensive game in many years before the largest throng to witness a high school football game in Lower Bucks County history.

The Redskin victory avenged a nasty 12-licking suffered a year ago at Allentown, but also served notice to the State of Pennsylvania that Football in this rapidly growing region is to be recognized now and in the future.

The Canaries, who own victories over Paterson Park, Md. (6-0) and Pennsylvania (18-0) never threatened. One Neshaminy failed to make a first down on its own 20 but Allentown just could not move the ball.

Neshaminy's ability to score twice in the first half was almost as big a factor as their defense. The Redskins lifted Allentown's line to score its first marker and send the Canaries into confusion.

The Langhorne eleven repelled almost every Allentown offensive movement and only allowed the Canaries over the 50-yard line once in the first half.

Allentown's best efforts were being blocked by a "head-up" forward wall. The Canaries looked to be going out a 5-0 loser at the half but lightning-fast Al Gaskill eluded a host of tacklers with 1-45 left in the second period to set the stage for the second Neshaminy touchdown.

Forty-two seconds were on the clock when Gaskill ruffed pass to speeding Werner Frentrup for the 12th point of the game. This suddenness put Allentown into a fix and although a half had remained to be played it was apparent that the Canaries were bound to fly home a winner last night.

Junior end Ed Furellii wrote the ticket for the clinching six-point play with seven minutes left in the third session. Furellii sifted through the Canaries' front line to block Mike Mitty. Furellii attempted punt. Jerry Mohr fumbled on the ball and Neshaminy was off again.

Harry Schuh, who runs like a runaway, accelerated to race 11 lengths to the 18-yard line. Allentown bolstered the line to prevent

Gaskill's 45-yard run with seconds ticking away in the second period sparked the second TD. Frentrup's pass, catching off for the score ended a 70-yard rush. Schuh's marker in the third climaxed a 20-yard movement.

The Redskin line, keynoted by the outstanding play of Tom Nuss, Firelli, Jerry Mohr and Herb Cummings, hit hard and caused many Allentown fumbles, which cut the Canaries' valuable yardage. Jim Donmover, 16-pound senior, was a standout for Allentown on both offense and defense.
