Victory celebrations surely are short-lived at Neshaminy High. The Redskins last night mowed down Chester, 54-0, and this morning were on the practice field at 9:30 sharp.

Reason for the prompt redressing became next week's Skins go up against nemesis Easton High, the only team to beat them in the past three seasons.

Some 530 fans including the upstate Red Devils watched Neshaminy blitz Chester with a 21-point first quarter, a 40-point first half and an almost unbelievable total of 313 yards of rushing during the first two periods.

**Diversified Scoring**  
The remarkable thing about the Redskins' eight touchdowns was that many different players scored them: Bob Baxter, Bob Barr, Bill Brumzo, Johnny Tome, Mill Rasser, Tom Hays, Steve Preno and Ray Jenkins in that order.

Baxter, also a neat six-for-six in PAT placements, started the scoring avalanche by averaging the left side for 37 yards on Neshaminy's very first play from scrimmage. That was all the Skins needed.

He tried a variation of offensive patterns, that is, the 1, the single-wing, the shotgun and even the flying saucer formation but Neshaminy's defensive team was equal to the occasion.

**11th Straight Victory**  
The triumph was Neshaminy's 11th straight since that 12-7 loss to Easton last season and the 10th in the last 30 games since that similar 12-7 setback to the Red Devils in 1959 (the clubs played a 13-12 tie in 1960 to account for Neshaminy's only other non-victory).

Chester just couldn't get with the Redskins' super-charged signaling at Ryeleigh Field. Actually, the final score could have read 80-0 if Petercusek so desired, but didn't because underdog Chester was so out of sync.

In fact, Neshaminy scored every time it had the ball in the first half and every time it had the right side to pass with two minutes left.

Time raced 29 yards early in the second quarter to up the margin to 27-0 and a hit later Brumzo passed 14 yards to Rasser for Chester's first TD with a minute and a half gone.

After an overless third period, Brumzo uncorked a 25-yard touchdown pass to Preno followed by a 13-yard interception pass to Tom Hays. Chester's offensive movements were so ineffectual that the Bill Mitchell and Chuck Hamrick did the passing, and Frank Sneed and Russ Payne took most of the receiving.

## Wilson Backs Elude Bristol Tacklers In 32-0 Romp

Moved Wilson's slick back moved the ball well in its season opener last night as the Golden Rams lashed the Bristol Warriors into a 32-0 defeat before 3,000 fans at the Bristol High Field.

It was the first loss of the 11th season for Bristol which beat St. Paul's X, of Bangor, 18-13, last week.

**Horvath, Resavage Star**

the final and with Paul Shaddinger giving the bulk of the work. Wilson gained 129 in the air and had a total of 29 first downs. Bristol completed but three passes and netted 12 yards on the ground.

Just before the close of the half, Horvath scored from the seven for the fourth touchdown. The play climaxed a drive of 90 yards with Walsh tossing three successful aerials, two to Resavage and the other to Gary Steele for a total of 39 yards and Resavage got off on a 25-yard jaunt.

**Shaddinger Scores**  
The final touchdown ended a 70-yard drive with Shaddinger scoring from the four. The biggest gain in the march was a 24-yard pass, Walsh to Mancini.

Bristol almost had had a score in the third quarter but Bill Carle in the end zone. He was out of bounds when he finally held on to the ball which was Wilson's 20th in the game.

## Owls Score 21-2 Win In Doylestown

The Bensalem Owls, bouncing back from a 25-6 defeat at the hands of Coatesville last week, upset Central Bucks, 21-2, last night on the Bus' field before 3,000 fans.

The victory places Bensalem right up front in the lower Bucks football picture as the Owls showed a well coordinated offense plus a line that could move when needed.

**Buck Score First**  
The game started in the manner that many people had expected. Central Bucks, co-edits of the Bus-Mont League last season, took the opening kickoff and moved 90 yards in 11 plays to score the first marker. The drive was climaxed by a 54 yard run by Ray Ross to put the Bus in front 6-0. The extra point attempt failed.

Bensalem was unable to move the ball after taking the kickoff and Charlie Madie had to punt the Owls out of danger. A couple of penalties and a beautiful kick by Bensalem's Jim Detmer which threw the Bus' quarterback, Bob Snyder for a loss, forced Central Bucks to return the punt.

Madie ran back the punt to the host's 50 yard stripe and in six plays the Owls moved across the goal with Jack Kiebel carrying the final three yards in quarter back sneak. Al Heller's kick for the extra point was good and the quarter ended with the Owls in front 7-6.

The game score-versed back and forth in the second frame with Bensalem coach Martin VanLoren alternating his offense between a single wing and a T formation. Neither was able to score until, with 12 seconds left in the half, Madie took a handoff from Kiebel and raced 18 yards for the second score. Heller's kick was good again.

Madie scored again in the third quarter on a pass play from Kiebel in which Bensalem line did an outstanding job of setting up a protective guard to lead him across the goal. Heller's boot made the score 21-6.

The final scoring came in the last period when Jim Davis plunged one yard for the Bus' second six yard score. The attempted kick was blocked. Heller's boot made the score 21-12.

Although Central Bucks outscored the Owls statistically, more yards gained and more first downs, Bensalem controlled the game in the moments when it counted most. Madie was a standout in offensive kicking and defensive play. The Owls line, led by Lew Adams, Bob Mocer, Jay Samero and Heller, charged the Central Bucks backs with a show of defensive strength that could well lead Bensalem to a Section Two title.

Jack Kiebel, who is only a sophomore, surely warms the hearts of the Bensalem coaches. The young quarterback ran the team with the coolness of a seasoned signal caller in addition to playing a good game in his linebacker position.
