

Neshaminy Seeks To Enter New Up-State Grid League

But Redskins Will Also Remain In LBCL

Neshaminy High has submitted its application and entry fee to the newly - organized football league which will be composed mostly of up-state teams. The new league's schedule will take effect in 1963.

According to Harry E. Frank, athletic director of Neshaminy High, the Neshaminy school board approved the Neshaminy team entering the league and gave permission to send its application and entry fee. This was one of the requirements of the league.

The league, as yet unnamed, will be divided into two sections. Along with Neshaminy in its section will be Bethlehem, Easton, Dieruff of Allentown, Allen of Allentown, and Phillipsburg, N.J. The division means that Neshaminy will travel only as far as the teams in the Allentown section.

Teams Interested

The teams of the other section have not been named as yet, but some of the schools who were at the first meetings included Scranton, Scranton Central, Old Forge, and Berwick.

With a five-game schedule in its new league, Neshaminy will be able to continue to play in its

division of the Lower Bucks League which is composed of four teams, including the Redskins. In the Lower Bucks circuit, Neshaminy must meet Woodrow Wilson, Pennsbury, and William Tennent.

However, the Lower Bucks officials will decide after this grid season whether or not to continue with the present split. Should the Lower Bucks League go back to its group of nine schools, all in one league, then Neshaminy will drop from the Lower Bucks circuit.

11 Games

Neshaminy plays an 11-game schedule this year and will play the same number of games in 1962, so even if it does play in both leagues in 1963, it will still have room for two more games.

The Redskins play Bishop Egan, Chester, Easton, Allen of Allentown, Bristol, Woodrow Wilson, Pennsbury, Delhaas, William Tennent, Delaware Township, and Bensalem this year in the order named.

Next season, Neshaminy will drop Bristol from its schedule and will play Bethlehem in its place. The 'Skins will not play Delaware Township in 1962 but its place has not been filled on the schedule.

Feyh Gets Touch

Feyh was nicked for single tallies in the first and second innings and then whitewashed Colonial the remainder of the game.

Foltz was in hot water in the early stages of the game and was aided by fine fielding to keep the Contractors from nudging the point-scoring station. Foltz was helped by two double-plays, one in the fourth and the other in the seventh, ending the game.

Foltz chalked up one strikeout and did not pass a runner. Feyh had four strikeouts and walked two.

Colonial made all their hits in the first three innings. In fact, after Vic Gring opened the third by beating out a hit to first, Feyh retired every batter to face him, 13 straight.

However, it was in the first two frames that Feyh's magic failed him and enabled Bob Wade's team to push over the pair of runs that gave it the win.

Vince Sibel opened the game with a triple which both Jack Bowman and Phil Shurtleff chased but did not bucket. Barry Mills scored Sibel with a hit to center. Ira Romberger drew a walk and Feyh appeared in trouble. Harry Torbert lined a hit to left and Bowman's pickup and throw to the plate nailed Malle trying to score.
