

Neshaminy Halts Egan, 14-0



Redskins Held Scoreless In 1st Half Before 7,000

Neshaminy High's Redskins started their latest scalp collection last night. The 'Skins, after being held scoreless during the first half, pushed across a pair of second-half touchdowns to whip Bishop Egan, 14-0, before some 7,000 fans at Neshaminy Field.

It was the season's initial grid encounter for both clubs and stretches Neshaminy's undefeated senior to 21 contests over a two-year span.

Senior fullback Bruce Evans and sophomore halfback Bob Baxter shared the TD limelight while Bill Schemberg accounted for both extra points.

First Varsity Play
Evans' six-pointer came from one yard away with 5:21 remaining in the third period. Baxter's tally came from 21 yards out with only 20 seconds left in the game. It was his first varsity play.

Bishop Egan, rated an underdog, battled the Redskins on even terms while seeking atonement for last season's thrashing. The Eagles appeared the stronger for awhile, but Neshaminy's bruising line play wore down the Egan program.

Operating from their stereotyped single-wing formation, Neshaminy's gridmen broke the scoring ice on Evans' plunge which climaxed a 10 - play series of 58 yards. It was a last-down effort.

Baxter's touchdown was the 11th play of a series which covered 80 yards.

Share Ball-Carrying
Sharing the offensive burden for the Redskins were Ed Kaminski and Bob Barr, with Tom Prent handling a fair share of the blocking assignments from his quarterback slot.

Len Lori was the workhorse of

the Egan backfield while Al Pezalla, Gus Cosmas, Joe Lyman, Mike Cressi, Johnny Kerr and Herb Rutherford helped out with the ball-toin'.

Although the Eagles were on the short end of a 12-0 first-down listing, they had enjoyed a 5-4 edge at halftime. Dick Bedesene's charges saw that advantage vanish with the sawdust, with the second half kickoff as the Redskin offensive machine started churning on all cylinders.

Egan's gridmen had chalked up 59 of their 113 rushing - yards gained in the first quarter, then registered the second half of that total during the last three cantos.

Pants Anatomy
Deepest penetration for either club in the first half was Egan's movement to the Neshaminy 20 on the third play of the second quarter. An incomplete pass and a 10-yard loss killed the drive permanently.

In fact, the first two chapters were weighed down with seven punts four by Neshaminy.

The Redskins started their move to paydirt by assuming possession on the 42 after Egan's four downs allowed nothing following the sec-

ond half kickoff. Kaminski and Barr did most of the hauling but scoring honors went to fullback Evans.

Insurance Touchdown
In the final stanza, Egan surrendered possession via a punt and Neshaminy took over on the 20. Evans and Barr compiled most of the yardage en route to paydirt, gaining 16 and 15 yards respectively in one clip.

Baxter then entered the fray, took a handoff around the right side and squirmed past the Eagle defenders for the second TD.

Schemberg, who booted the first PAT, ran for the second when the pass from center was high.

Neshaminy's last setback was inflicted by Easton in the second game of an 11-game schedule two years ago. The Redskins swept unbeaten last fall but had their leg marred by a tie with the same Red Rover.

WILLOW GROVE — William Tennent's supposedly-strong offense failed to materialize last night as the Panthers went down to a blistering 26-7 defeat at the hands of Upper Moreland's Golden Bears before 2,000 fans at the Upper Moreland High School Field.

Tennent's rushing yardage showed a net loss of 10 yards for three of 16 passes for a total of 4 yards. The Panthers made only five first-downs - 3 on the round and two on penalties.

Upper Moreland's offense went into high gear in the second period when it scored three times, added another TD in the final quarter to take a 26-0 lead. Tennent scored with 16 seconds remaining.

Lead Scores Two
Ronnie Lear scored a pair of touchdowns for the Bears, both on ones, one through the line and the other on an end sweep. Al Johnson scored an Upper Moreland six-pointer on a pass interference play with 26 yards while the final touchdown came when Dick Behrens completed a 50-yard pass play to

kick attempt and he was spilled on his 35.

Bachich Scores
After Bachich completed a nine-yard pass to Jack Betterly, the clock showed 1:35 left. Bachich went to the air again and his pass misfired but interference was called and UM was penalized 15 yards, putting the ball on the 15-yard line.

Steve Boston clicked off five and, with nine second left, Bachich hit the line and carried two bears with him as he crossed the goal line. Ken Mapes booted the conversion.

Tennent's 5-3-4 defense made up of Charlie Wobensmith, Roy Zintell, Jim Hanline, Jack Ryan, and Kent Cromwell up front, Wayne Webb, Boston, and John Keeney as line-backers and Joe Kerry, Bachich, and Betterly in the sec-

ondary, contained Upper Moreland in the first period and did not give up a first down.

The Panthers passed up a scoring chance in this session when Boston recovered an Upper Moreland fumble on the home team's 30. It completed a pass. Bachich to Betterly, to put the ball on the 24 but the attack died.

Fumble Helps UM
Upper Moreland scored as the result of a fumble after 5:32 elapsed in the second session. Charlie Loutz recovered the fumble on the Tennent 20. Lear skirted end for 19 yards to put the ball on the one-yard line. He then tried the line without success and Behrens was thrown for a yard loss. On third down, Lear slammed at the middle and went over for the TD. He also kicked the extra point.

Following the touchdown kickoff, Golden Bears hit paydirt again. The kickoff was run back to the 35 by Boston. Bachich could not pass on the first play and lost 12 yards. His second attempt to pass was intercepted by Al Johnson who went 26 yards for the touchdown.
