## Newspapers Eleven Lists Eight Seniors

Eight seniors and three juniors were named today in the Courier Times All-Lower Bucks County High School Football League first team.

The newspapers' team, picked by members of the sport's greatest, has only one holdover from last year. He's Frank Conroy, tackle from Neshauney, Conroy played guard last season.

Two other players, tackle Vernon Von Sydow, of Pennsylvania, and halfback Bob Hart, of Morrisville, moved up from last season's second string all-star team.

Rounding out the 1962 team are ends Barry Turk, Delhas, and James Allen, Morrisville; center Joe Pantoja, Tennent; quarterback Sam Mude, Bensalem; halfback Bob Johnson, Tennent, and fullback Clyde Beagle, Council Rock.

There were outstanding halfbacks played in the league. 1961, Tennent's Johnson, a junior, was a unanimous choice.
