NEW YORK (UPI) — With another howling season getting underway, high-scoring Sylvia went to the ball park to get a word to frustrated legions that it never too late to learn how to howl in the right way.

"I'm aiming at the ones who are at home howling now," explained the howling beauty who holds the world record of 11 series in 1957. "The ones who are on the 10 or 19 and never seem to get any better."

The secret, she insists, is in timing and coordination.

"As for the women, the thing that holds them back in the majority is their refusal to 'swing it.'"

"On the whole, women mostly don't roll a ball enough," says Sylvia, who carried a 206 average record averaging in three straight seasons. "The principal reasons are that they hold themselves so tight or they don't roll the ball high enough."

Her suggestion is, for more speed, to hold the ball higher; for more ball, to "push away" harder as the approach is started.

"Amplify can develop into a good bowler if they will practice a smooth approach and swing for timing," she argues.

Sylvia swears by "Tommy Pie," who she is only a few inches tall; she was voted the "Woman Bowler of the Year" in 1955 after winning the national individual match game championship.
