

# Spring City, Royersford Win

## Pirates Surprise Boyertown 28-14 In Perk Triumph

Rolling Spring City, the Perkiomen-Schuylkill league surprise package, scored twice in the final period Saturday at home to turn back Boyertown, 28-14, and move nearer second place in the league's Big Four.

Playing without the services of fullback Jack Christ, the Bucks sent Terry Taschner and Dick Rosen out to net their fifth straight triumph and sixth in eight games.

Putting on a great show of strength in the last half, after a 7 to 7 stalemate at halftime, the Pirates hit where it hurt the last two periods with mighty line smashes.

The Bears, too, packed a hard wallop, particularly in the second period, when they marched from their own 18-yard line with five first downs in a row to the Spring City 16-yard line, lost the ball on the 11, but later recovered it and scored on Bob Magee's 20-yard sprint. This gesture tied the score, after Spring City had tallied in the first bracket.

Dick Yerzy, Boyertown back, took the first kick-off on the ten-yard line and reached the 29 before he was stopped. After rushing for two first downs, the Bears failed to penetrate and Meckery booted to Terry Taschner, Spring City back, on the Pirate 25.

Despite a 15-yard penalty on the first try for Spring City, the Pirates scored three first downs, lost the ball on their own 30, but later regained it on the Bear 49, from which point Paul Neborsk picked up five yards and Taschner pitched a pass to Neborsk, who caught it on the ten and raced across the line for the first score. Taschner had added the extra digit via a placement, putting Spring City 7 to 0 in the lead.

# Few Unbeaten Open To Post-Season Bids

NEW YORK, Nov. 12 (AP)—Perfect records will be scarce as hen's teeth in the Jan. 1 bowl games and, as matters stand now, the post-season business will add little light to the scramble for national honors.

Of the seven major teams able to answer today to the roll call of unbeaten and untied, two—Army and Princeton—are allergic to bowls and a third—Oklahoma—appears to have had enough of them.

Oklahoma authorities, in announcing opposition to a post-season game this year, left the way open, however, for the players themselves to make the final choice. So don't be alarmed to see the soomers around New Year's Day.

If not, that leaves Kentucky, California, Wyoming and Loyola of California as unblemished bowl prospects, with the latter two boasting unusually strong teams but unimposing schedules.

Here's how we'd rate major bowl possibilities going into the November stretch:

Virtual clinch—California

SMU, 25-20, to remain definitely in the Southwest race. It was the second straight reversal for the Mustangs, until a week ago rated No. 1.

IF OKLAHOMA chooses to play, it probably can have its pick of the Sugar, Cotton and Orange bowls. The Sooners, trailing for three quarters, exploded four touchdowns in the final period to whip around Kansas, 33-13, for their 28th in a row. They play Missouri next and then run against Nebraska and the redoubtable Mr. Bob Reynolds.

An upset for Nebraska would put the Cornhuskers squarely in the bowl picture. The once-beaten and

## Fords Turn Back Neshaminy 19-12 For Seventh Win

A crippled Royersford High team had enough left Saturday to nick Neshaminy, 19-12, at Langhorne in the inaugural of a new gridiron rivalry and boost its winning total to seven games in eight tries.

Playing without the services of quarterback Emidio Cinciripio and halfbacks Paul Fairhellner and Al Fischer, all regulars, the Forders slipped out front in the first quarter, and stayed there despite repeated assaults.

The running of Jack Krasley, lone backfield regular afloat, and Gary Foreman's passing were the utensils Royersford used to rebound from a shocking 24-7 loss to East Greenville.

Krasley counted the first marker early in the first quarter after a 72-yard march. He was the big ground-gainer all the way and the TD man when he circled end from the one. Foreman kicked the point that enabled Royersford to hold the lead at halftime.

Neshaminy came back in the second quarter to tally when Al Hoffman picked up Lou Alexander's fumble and ran 58 scoring yards.

IN THE THIRD round, after an exchange of fumbles that found Ray Slawicki falling on the most important one, Royersford scored again. Armand Cinciripio and Fred DePaoli carried to the one, whence Foreman sneaked over.

Again in the last round, the Eagle struck. Foreman picked up a Neshaminy fumble at the foe 15, and Krasley, Gary Grater and DePaoli moved to the 12. From there Foreman pitched to Bob Troxell for the tally.

Neshaminy's final TD was the by-product of another Alexander fumble at the Ford 45. From there the hosts marched to the 25, whence Ralph Mongillo passed and ran over on two plays.
