In less than six years, Neshaminy has developed into one of the strongest football schools in Eastern Pennsylvania. The Langhorne jointure hasn't lost a Lower Bucks County League game in 56 outings.

But along with this success there are some problems. Only last week, Bensalem, Neshaminy's longtime Thanksgiving Day rival, asked for a cancellation of next year's game. Bensalem felt it could no longer compete on even terms with Neshaminy.

That's one of the reasons Neshaminy is anxious to hook up in the new East Penn Football League proposed two years ago by the Allentown School District Athletic Council.

Neshaminy has found the competition somewhat tougher in the Lehigh Valley. Although the Bucks Countians won two and tied one in three games with L.V. schools this year, the outcomes have been much closer than they have had in their own league.

With Dieruff scheduling Neshaminy next year, four of the Big Five schools will be on the Redskins schedule in 1963. As soon as the various schedules are adjusted, the new league will comprise Allen, Dieruff, Easton, Bethlehem, Neshaminy and Phillipsburg.

There is still room for more, and with the problems in the Central Penn Conference the supporters of the EPL might consider York, Reading, Lancaster, Lebanon and Williamsport. Those schools are being squeezed out by the Harrisburg schools, which hope to have a conference of their own some day.
