

Neshaminy Victor On Rumsey Runbacks

George Rumsey's long runbacks led Neshaminy High School's football team, defending Lower Bucks County League champion, to a 20-0 victory over Pennridge, 1955 Bux-Mont Conference titlist, last night at Sellersville.

Rumsey started Neshaminy toward its second victory of the season with a 20-yard punt return and a 40-yard burst through left tackle on the next play. This set up a four-yard first-quarter scoring plunge off right tackle by Jim Reilly.

After Jerry Mladjan slammed a yard for a third-quarter touchdown at the end of a 68-yard march, Rumsey returned an intercepted Bob Hunsicker pass 26 for the winners' last touchdown. He also kicked two extra points.

BALDASENO GOES 68, 44

Joe Baldaseno scored on runs of 68 and 44 yards to pace Norristown to a 27-6 victory over nearby rival Conshohocken in the opener for both. Baldaseno dislocated his right shoulders in the last quarter. Warner Smith ran six yards for Conshohocken's TD.

Conestoga's Chesmont League champs whipped Bridgeport, 51-0, in the circuit opener for both. Ed Byrd scored three six-pointers, on two 15-yard runs and another of 10. Bill Delaware ran 58 for another.

Fred Williamson went one yard and 37 and Art Mancuso three and two yards for touchdowns as Bristol beat Collegetown, 30-0. Jim Johnson also ran 31 for the winners.

End Norman Leight caught a 26-yard touchdown pass in the final second of the first half, then intercepted three Pottstown passes and blocked a punt in the second half as North Penn opened its season with a 20-12 victory at Pottstown.

Chisox 3, Orioles 2

Northey Single Decides in 11th

CHICAGO, Sept. 14 (AP).—Ron Northey's pinch single in the 11th inning knocked in the winning run tonight as the White Sox edged the Baltimore Orioles, 3-2, to move within one-half game of the second-place Cleveland Indians.

It was the second consecutive extra-inning game that Northey has broken up with a pinch single. The 36-year-old utility outfielder has collected 13 hits and driven in 19 runs in 31 trips to the plate.

Sherman Lollar began the 11th inning with a walk, moved to second on Sam Esposito's single and scored on Northey's hit.

Chicago combined a walk, sacrifice and error for a hitless run in the first inning, but Baltimore tied it in the seventh on a walk, single and Dick Donovan's wild pitch.

The White Sox scored again in the eighth, but Bob Nieman sent the game into extra innings when he led off the ninth with a double, moved to third on Tito Francona's single and scored on Gus Triandos' infield grounder.

Donovan, who got credit for the victory, chalked up eight strikeouts, three of them in the eighth.
